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#### Countdown to the EU ICS (Import Control System)

#### Details for Europe Shipments

- The scheduled date for full compliance is January 1, 2011
- All goods entering any of the 27 member countries must make a security filing
- FROB (Freight Remaining on Board) and Transshipments are included
- Currently, the import aspect of the new EU Security Requirements is known as the ICS (Import Control System)
- In turn, ICS is part of the overall EU AIS (Automated Import System)

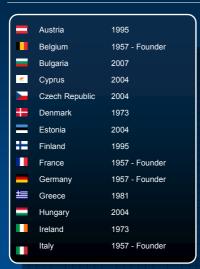

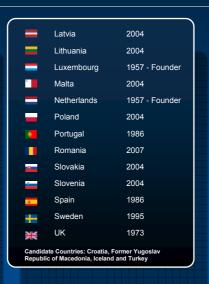

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# Time limits for the lodging of an ENS

Containerised maritime cargo (except short sea containerised shipping)	At least 24 hours before commencement of loading in each foreign load port
Bulk/ break bulk maritime cargo (except short sea bulk/ break bulk shipping)	At least 4 hours before arrival at the first port in the Community
Short sea shipping:	At least 2 hours before arrival at the first port in the Community
Short haul flights (less than 4 hours duration)	At least by the time of the actual take off of the aircraft
Long haul flights (more than 4 hours duration)	At least 4 hours before arrival at the first airport in the Community
Rail and inland waterways	At least 2 hours before arrival at the customs office of entry in the Community
Road traffic	At least 1 hour before arrival at the customs office of entry in the Community



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### Countdown to the EU ICS (Import Control System)

Member States Responsibilities include the need to:

- · Accept or Reject the Filing
- Issue MRN (Movement Reference Number)
- Issue response messages to the carrier(s) or Nominated Filers
- Apply Risk Analysis to all transactions regardless of ultimate destination (including FROB)
- Assign Risk type such as risk a, b, c, Clear, Do Not Load.
- Do Not Load inspection in custom of 1st entry port or port of discharge
- Clearance for loading is up to each individual Member State to prescribe





# **ENS lodged by other persons?**

- ENS can be filed at MBL level (carrier) or HBL level (Freight forwarder)
- Only With the "knowledge and consent of the ocean Carrier", however both MBL# and HBL# must be included
- Declarant is responsible to the filing content



### Countdown to the EU ICS (Import Control System)

- The EU expects details about each shipment at the MASTER BL level from the Carrier and at the HBL Level from NVOCC after consent from the carrier.
- Declarant is only obliged to provide the information known to it at the time of lodgment of the ENS.
- Carrier is only required to provide the information "known" relying on the information in MBL to file the ENS
- Freight Forwarders can be identified as both Consignor and the consignee
- "To Order" shipment, no consignee is required but with special code -10600-

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### **Update on US ISF (Importer Security Filing)**

Failure to file: When there is a complete failure to file an ISF, CBP may choose one of the following: issue a Do Not Load (DNL) message to the carrier at the foreign port of lading; withhold permission for the carrier to unload the subject goods at the first U.S. port of arrival; delay permission to unload at the first U.S. port of arrival; issue a seizure notification; withhold Customs release of the goods for movement to General Order (G.O.); or issue a claim for liquidated damages.

Late submission. A claim for liquidated damages will be issued in the amount of \$5,000. As CBP expected, the phase-in period has demonstrated several commercial challenges in obtaining all of the information required in a timely manner. CBP indicates they will be fair in evaluating the timeliness of the filing and will continue to work with those parties who have participated in the process to date.

Inaccurate submission: A claim for liquidated damages will be issued in the amount of \$5,000. CBP acknowledges some data is beyond the control of the importer, such as rolled bookings and vessel diversions, and will take these factors into account.

When there are successive filings of the ISF data, CBP will consider only the latest filing within the allowed filing timeframe (typically the last ISF filed) for a liquidated damages claim for inaccurate submission.
